## Ethics:

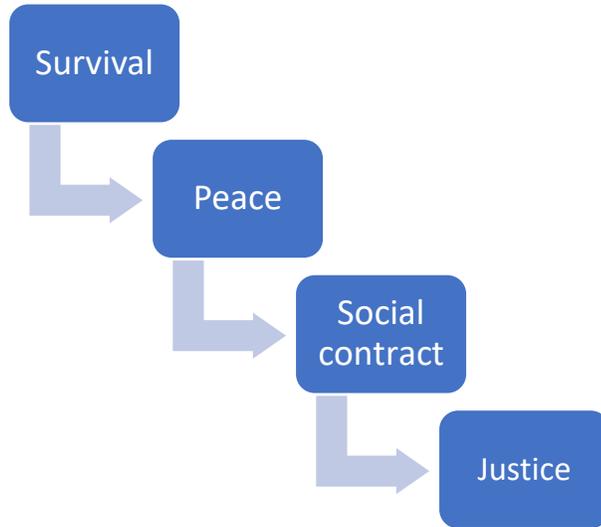
“the discipline concerned with what is morally good and bad, and morally right and wrong (and any system or theory of moral values or principles)”

# History to present

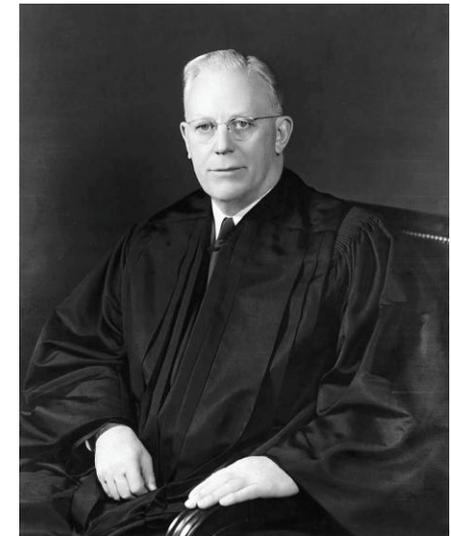


Thomas Hobbes, 1588 – 1679. Philosopher who abandoned theology, focussing on the practical = human experience. Developer Social Contract



“In civilised life, law floats in a sea of ethics”

Earl Warren, Chief Justice USA, 1891 - 1974



Particularly important in the absence of rules (law) = “Do no harm” (Prevention principle)

....not obligations, to balance inherent self interest

# Add in law and contracts?

- Including **rules on ethical matters** e.g.
  - Anti-corruption
  - Modern slavery
  - Procurement
  - Health and safety on site
  - Money: minimum wage, payment standards
- Why? State is no longer all-powerful, all-owning
- B2B and B2C arrangements - ‘freedom of contract’ subject to law
  - Inherent **risk and reward, driven by economics**

Ethics isn't law, so cannot be forced. Ultimately, **contracts (= market)** cannot **(and do not)** solve every problem, and regulation (= law) is needed.

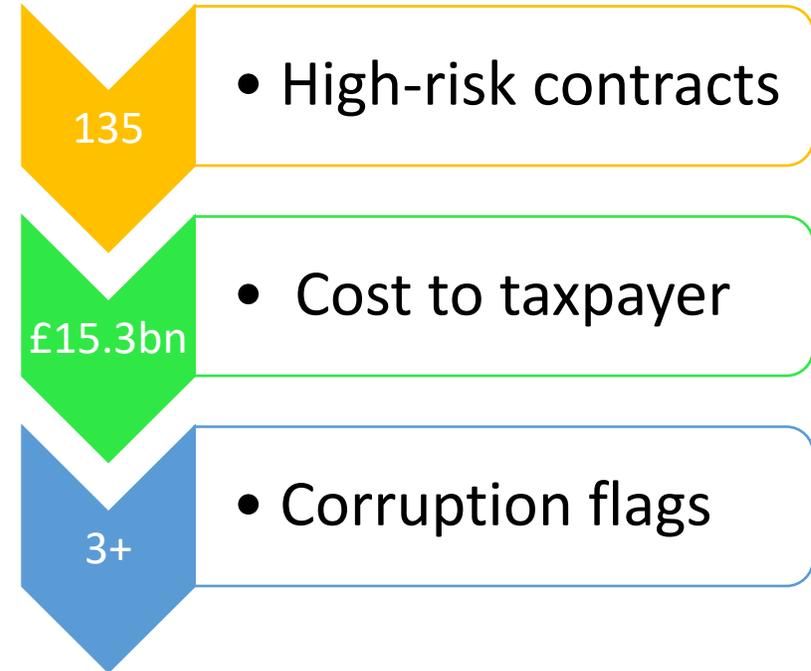

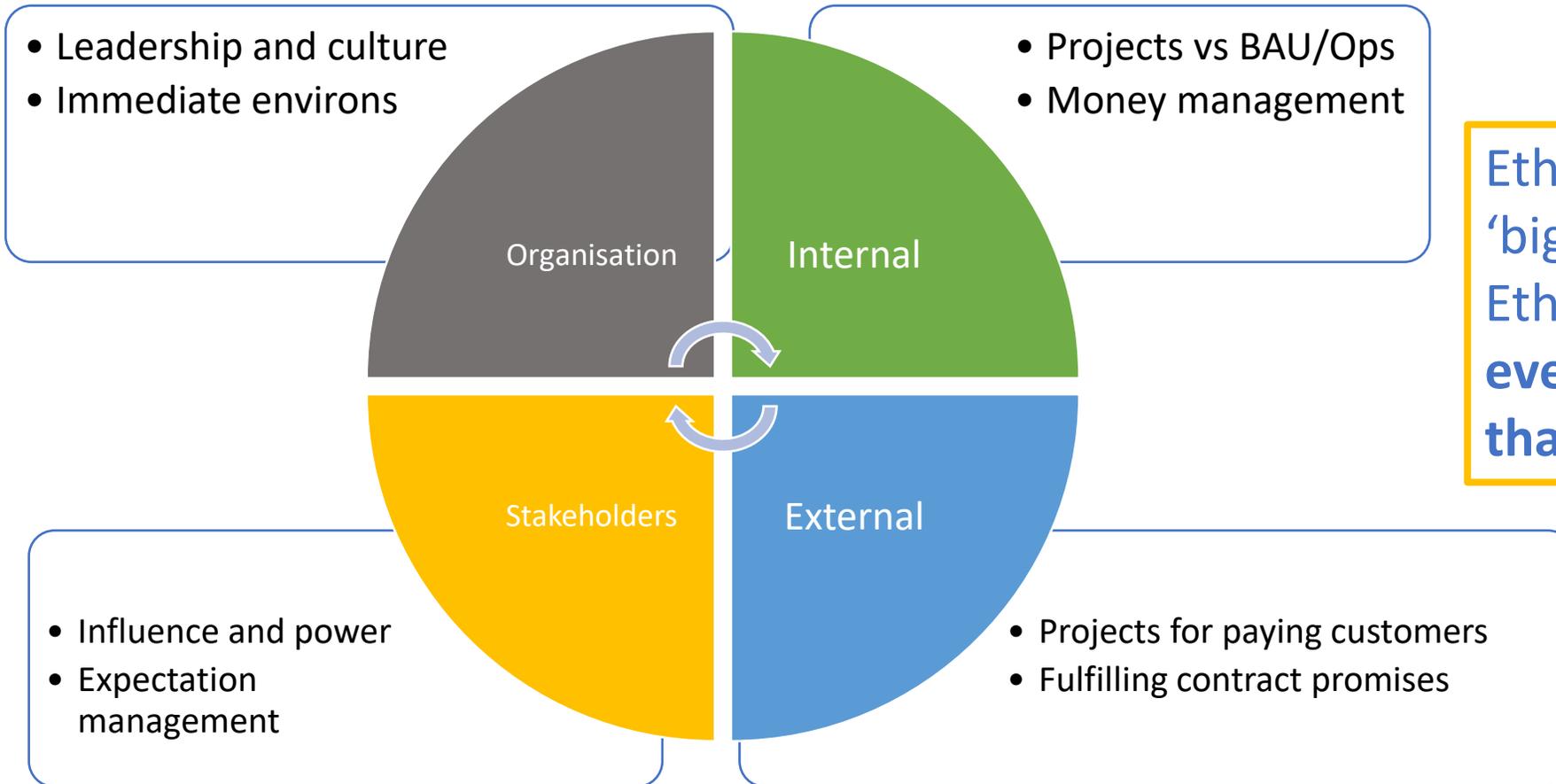

# Case Studies

Facts: Senior PM checked projects database for their Org's likely involvement in corrupt contracts as uncovered by Government Body, and therefore possible exposure. PM found involvement and reported to MD, who buried it.

Dilemma: What to do?

Outcome: PM asked MD for update and meeting to discuss, but was told to continue working on projects.

Later, left job as too stressed, and could not be part of cover-up.

Facts: Services' offered by Project Director to 'mate' outside of approved process. Junior PM spotted invoices but was told to pay them by PD. Project Controller's dashboard was affected.

Dilemma: Now what?

Outcome: PM doing job but under duress; PC dashboard inaccurate.

PM told Finance 1 colleague, and PC.

Finance 2 made internal audit and got PD removed from project. PC corrected dashboard. PM continued.

Facts: Director at construction SME asked client to pay him directly instead of to the business. Client later sued for defective work.

Dilemma: What next?

Outcome: Good defence on facts - claim for defects dismissed.

Dir had to repay sum and explain to judge and tax authority. Lucky to avoid official reprimand (civil) and/ or fine (criminal).

Client took next business elsewhere.

# What can project controls professionals do?

Before	During	After
Be prepared: avoid isolation	Fulfilling without undue influence or turning a blind eye	Take some time out
Check TI index (if non-UK) and who's who incl stakeholders	Have a confidante, keep a diary	Know you did your bit for Ethics
Role and responsibility: how will you influence, voice with Ethics	Base your decisions/ recommendation on the contract	Accept courage in difficult circumstances
Read the contract to understand interfaces and boundaries	Explain evenly and fairly: project neutrality	Know that Ethics is for everyone to work harder at
Ask for a pre-start/ get to know	Accept short-term ethical pain for long term propriety	Learn some lessons for next time
Everyday Ethics = employing professional curiosity	Everyday Ethics = being the steady, professional hand	Everyday Ethics = securing project reputation (and contributing to VfM)

# Diversity – ethical, happier, healthier and successful

- Donald Brown, anthropologist **diverse group is more ethical and successful**, and, consistently, **high global ratings for integrity, responsibility, forgiveness and compassion**
- Women have “*stricter ethical standards than men e.g. unacceptable behaviour*”, IBE
- Women “*bring new perspectives to the table, broadening the content of boardroom discussions to include multiple stakeholders*”, Kramer
- **Diversity of all sorts** brings a “*new era of governance*”, Heidrick

# Diversity - business value and Ethics

- What do women add?
  - Balance to numbers
  - Diversity thus representative of society
  - *“Smart economics”*, World Bank
  - *“Social performance and reputation”*, Bear
- What does DEI add?
  - *“DEI is associated with higher long-term market performance”*, LSE
- Good business and ethical sense

Women tend to help to maintain a steady ethical business compass ...  
BUT this is not their responsibility!

# New workplace – hello, AI

“Transformation, where the future of project management blends AI and human ingenuity, fuelled and guided by our global community”, PMI 2024

21%

of respondents say they are using AI (PMI research)

82%

of senior leaders say AI will have at least some impact on projects (PMI research)

91%

believe AI will have at least a moderate impact on the profession (PMI research)

# AI – business value...

- Opportunities look immense:
  - ‘Munch’ data rapidly, and find patterns e.g. to predict weather events
  - Be ‘generative’ i.e. trained e.g. to tailor medicine, trace ground conditions
  - Save money and time in ‘trawling’ archives/artefacts e.g. defects by trades
- But challenges exist:
  - No global standard, technology is being developed faster than Governments can debate what to do about it (let alone regulate it)
  - Web ‘scrape’ uses unknown sources
  - Outputs can be unreliable or ‘hallucinate’

➤ What do we do with the results?

# AI's effect – ... and Ethics?

- What will AI do to the workplace (and what is it already doing)?
- Projects: routine, and beyond
- Will humans will do ‘just the interesting stuff’?
- For now, use it to **aid your skillset**
  - Controlling what is fed in, thus obtain a quality output
  - Organisational protocol and policy
  - Client confidentiality
  - Law: IP, GDPR, **UK AI Framework**, EU AI Act
- **Can AI and Ethics be ‘happy colleagues’?**
